1.	<u>Blurred Vision:</u> It is normal for the vision to be blurry intermittently for the first week after surgery, particularly immediately after using the ointment, and marked vision loss should be reported immediately to Prof Sullivan.

3.	Pain/Discomfort: It is normal for discomfort at the wound site, particularly for the first 48 hours; severe pain that is not relieved with Paracetamol should be directed to Prof Sullivan						
4.	Bruising/Swelling: Bruising and swelling are very common and will last several weeks after surgery. Some people will have none or minimal bruising and swelling, others quite a						
5.	lot and variation among individuals is very common. Redness: Mild redness at the wound site is common, particularly in the early period after surgery. Any redness that is worsening and associated with increased pain may indicate infection. If this is occurring, notify Prof Sullivan immediately.
